From the Pastor's Desk...

Friends,

Sometimes when my family is driving home from school or church, my four-year-old will ask "Can we imagine together?" As she sees the cars and trucks passing us by, we take turns imagining where everyone is headed. We imagine that some people are:

- Going to visit their grandkids
- · Going to work
- Headed to Canada
- Driving to the airport
- · Coming home from church
- · Going to school
- Going to the grocery store
- Going to visit Daniel Tiger's neighborhood (a favorite kids' TV character)

We have no idea where everyone is really headed. Some of our imaginings are probably correct. And some might be a little far-fetched.

Imagining is like that. When we imagine, at first, we may envision ideas based on the facts we have and what we know to be possible. When we allow ourselves to do it, we can also think up ideas that push the boundaries of what seems possible. Then, we can begin to imagine outcomes, projects, and ways of being that are outside our norm. Sometimes, it's those outlandish imaginings that get us headed in the direction we actually need to go.

This month, the Stewardship Committee invites our congregation to **imagine**.

- We will imagine possibilities that we feel confident about and sure of, based on tried and true traditions.
- We will imagine what it's like to let some things go, in order to prepare the way for the arrival of something new.
- We will imagine a future we might not have expected, yet one that God holds and calls us into.
- We will try to imagine what God might have in mind for our community and how we can join our reality with God's.

Scripture offers so many entry points to think about imagination. God imagined the world and created it out of nothing. Jesus imagined a meal for 5,000 people from just a few loaves of bread and a couple of fish. Eventually, the Apostles imagined a community gathered around the risen Christ that included a wider diversity of people than they originally wanted or expected. When we imagine, we practice our faith and seek to let God guide our minds and our hearts.

I hope you will enjoy the stories of imagination in this newsletter and in the colorful brochure that will come to you later this month. I hope you will join me in imagining what it would mean to take a step up in your financial pledge and giving to the church in the 2020-2021 year. The Stewardship Campaign is taking place a bit earlier this year so we can fully engage with the theme of Lent throughout that entire season, which begins on March 1. Read more about our theme for Lent in these pages.

As we go forward in faith, I ask of you: "Can we imagine together?"

PRESBYTERIAN PILGRIMAGE



Earla B. Smith Foundation

The Earla B. Smith Foundation was established with a generous monetary gift to First Presbyterian Church and to the Troy School District by long-time church member, Earla Smith, upon her death. The funds are managed by Horizon Advisers, and each year the interest accrued is distributed to FPCRO and the Troy School District, where Earla Smith was a teacher. Seventy five percent of the funds are distributed to FPCRO and twenty five percent to Troy Schools. The funds are designated, by the Trust, to be used for scholarships by the Troy Schools and for Music Ministry and/or Christian Education by FPCRO. Included, but not limited to, this list of possible requests:

- vocal or instrumental soloists, or groups
- the purchase of books, or other materials, relating to a project or program
- · outside speakers
- projects that support the missionary ministry of the church

 initial funding for pilot programs, which if successful, would eventually be funded through the church

Requests for funding for programs/activities can be submitted to Pastor Emma Nickel or Kari Peruski. All requests are reviewed by the Earla B. Smith Committee, which includes the senior pastor, the church administrator and the two FPCRO board members. After review, requests then go to the Session and, when approved, are presented to the full Board of Directors of the Foundation for approval. The Board is made up of two session members from FPCRO and the superintendent of the Troy Schools. Currently, Marilyn Sutton and Edie Watson represent FPCRO as board members. Richard Machesky, superintendent of Troy Public Schools represents the Troy Schools. The president of the Board is Daniel Doyle, CPA.

The following special programs/ministries have been funded by the Earla B. Smith Foundation in the 2019-2020 year:

- underwrite the cost of hiring high school students as Choral Scholars
- scholarships to defray the cost of attending the Michigan Presbyterian Pilgrimage, either in October or April
- underwrite the cost of two Michigan Opera Theater community programs, *Jack and the Beanstalk* and *I, Too, Sing America*
- underwrite the cost of Michigan Opera Children's Chorus holiday program
- underwrite the cost of a Dementia Support Conference
- underwrite the cost of instrumentalists and vocalists to partner with the Chancel Choir in a major work as part of a worship service
- purchase DVD's from Great Courses to supplement the library offerings
- supplement the cost of hosting the Empty Bowls project
- supplement the cost of a year-long focus on Save the Earth during WNL activities

Requests for funding of programs for next year are being sought for this year's designated funds. Request forms (available from Kari Peruski) are due by April 16 and may be submitted to either Pastor Emma or Kari Peruski.

"Talk to the Task Force"

Session created the Sustainability Task Force in November with the goal of identifying and recommending measures to bring the church's spending in line with its income. Over the course of many years, our church has been blessed with many generous endowment gifts intended to provide income and sustainability to the congregation for future generations. In the past decade we have come to rely on endowments for not just the income it produced, but also additional withdrawals from principal in order to fund day to day operations. The church needed to take more than \$97,000 from the endowment principal in the last fiscal year to meet its expenses. The continued depletion of endowment funds in this manner is not sustainable and action must be taken now to reduce the deficit.

The Sustainability Task Force has begun evaluating our expenditures, income and assets so it can recommend actions to Session that can be implemented immediately. To that end, it is seeking your comments, ideas and concerns. Congregation members are encouraged to fill out a "Talk to the Task Force" comment card available at the front desk, or submit your comments electronically using the QR at right, or visit: https://bit.ly/373STOB on or before February 3. Your voices are important, and all submissions will receive a personal follow-up from a member of the Task Force.

A SEASON TO TURN: FROM OUR WAY, TO GOD'S WAY

In our daily journeys most of us have learned to depend on our GPS to tell us which way we should turn, and if we are headed in the right direction. As we approach Lent, we ask you to consider the season as your SGS (Spiritual Guidance System), a calling to change direction from our self-serving way toward the self-giving way of the cross, God's way.

As Staff and the Worship and Music Committee met to discuss our focus for the Lenten season, we talked about the Greek word metanoia ("turning around"). This word implies not only a change of direction or heart, but is often translated as "repentance" in the

New Testament. But this kind of repentance is not about regret or guilt or shame; it implies making a decision to turn around, to face a new direction.

As spring emerges, the Northern Hemisphere is turning toward the sun (the source of life). So this season, we, too, turn away from sin and death toward God as our source.

Originally, though Lent contained elements of penitence, it was primarily a time of preparing those who were to be baptized. The season seems to have developed as a period of learning on what it means to be a follower of Christ. The period of Lent had and still has an emphasis on reaffirming baptismal identity, of knowing and living the faith. During Lent, we have the opportunity to reaffirm who we are and always will be, in anticipation of Easter.

[meh-ta-noy-ah] • Greek (n.) the journey of changing one's mind, heart, self, or way of life; spiritual conversion. We begin our journey on Ash Wednesday **February 26**, when we receive ashes and acknowledge the dust and broken debris of our lives and the reality of our own mortality. We listen for the word of God in the scriptures of the Lenten journey. We follow Jesus into the wilderness, resist temptation, fast, and proceed "on the way" to Jerusalem, and

the cross. What we hear during Lent is the power and possibility of the Easter mystery, that the way to Easter is through death. Christ, in being raised for us, shows us the new life beyond the power of death. So we are required to surrender the old life, so we might celebrate Easter transformed as new people.






