on **Sunday, December 8,** at **2 pm**, we are pleased to be hosting The Michigan Opera Theater Children's Chorus in a special concert, "**Sing Noel!**" Thanks to a grant from the Earla Smith Foundation this concert will be presented **free** of charge.

The Michigan Opera Theater Children's Chorus (MOTCC) is a permanent children's ensemble for metropolitan Detroit youth interested in vocal music and the theatrical arts. The chorus is under the over-all direction of Suzanne Mallare Acton, Michigan Opera Theater Chorus Master. The Principal Chorus, ages 10-16, is conducted by Assistant Director Dianna Hochella and accompanied by Joseph Jackson. The Preparatory Chorus, ages 8-11, is under the direction of Jane Panikkar and accompanied by Maria Cimarelli.

Now in its 12th year, the MOTCC appears with international opera stars in all main stage opera productions that call for children, presents an annual Holiday Concert at the opera House, and produces its own fully



staged children's opera every spring. Past members of the chorus include FPCRO member Amie Heitchue, and FPCRO is currently represented by member Grace Watson.

Since its founding in 2007, MOTCC has trained close to 400 singers, some of whom have gone on to study at some of the most prestigious conservatories in the United States. The program prepares young singers not only in the classical world but also other genres of music, including music theater, jazz and pop.

"MOTCC laid the most solid foundation for me in terms of musical training," said Ryan Hurley, Vocal Performance Major at the Julliard School. "There is no doubt I could be where I am today without this program."

Malaya Watson, American Idol finalist, and Composition Major at Berklee College of Music said MOTCC was her first professional performing experience. "To be around people that have the same drive and interest as you musically is a tremendous feeling. It made me feel like I belonged somewhere and exposed me to the classical side of music which I still enjoy to this day."

We are especially proud that this month alumnus Antonio Cipriano is making his Broadway debut in the new Alanis Morissette musical "Jagged Little Pill."

The mission of the MOTCC is to provide exceptional choral music and theatrical performance instruction in a professional environment. Offering a curriculum that embraces diverse cultures and traditions and a rich and extensive range of musical genres, the program seeks to instill personal and artistic excellence in its students

LESSONS AND CAROLS

The Chancel Choir will lead us in worship on **December 15**, (one service only at 10:30 am), in the traditional service of Lessons and Carols. This is a service of worship in which the fall of humanity, the promise of the Messiah, and the birth of Jesus are told in nine short Bible readings or lessons from Genesis, the prophetic books and the Gospels,

interspersed with the singing of carols, Hymns, and Anthems.

Although the tradition of Lessons and Carols is popularly associated with King's College, Cambridge, its origins are attributed to Truro Cathedral in Cornwall. Rev. Edward White Bensen, Bishop of Truro, concerned at the excessive consumption of alcohol in Cornish


pubs during the Christmas season, sought a means of attracting revelers out of the pubs and into the church by offering a religious celebration of Christmas. The idea for a service consisting of Christmas Music with Bible readings was proposed, and the first Service of Lessons and Carols was held on Christmas Eve of 1880.

Taking advantage of the established choral tradition of the King's College Chapel Choir, the service was introduced there in 1918 and has been done annually ever since. The service increased in popularity when the BBC began to broadcast it in 1928 and it has been heard every year since. Lessons and Carols at King's Chapel helped to popularize the service, spreading this idea to schools, chapels, and churches around the world.

essons

The first known celebration of this service in the United States was at The Groton School in Massachusetts in 1928, and the oldest service in an American parish church is at St. Thomas in Hanover, NH, where the service has been done annually since 1935.

The main theme of the Service of Lessons and Carol is the development of the loving purposes of God seen through the windows and words of the Bible. This service reminds us what Christmas is truly about and unites us across space and time with Christians around the world today and in the past who have listened to the same readings and have sung the same songs.



Be sure to pick up a What Can't Wait Advent Devotional to nurture your spirit this season. The booklets contain entries for each day of Advent starting on December 1 through Christmas Day. Enjoy poetic prayers, original visuals inspired by scripture, written reflections, prompts for visual meditation, prompts for journaling, colorable pages, and active prompts. Pick up a copy for your household at the reception desk in the Christian Education Lobby.

Wednesday Night Live


Our Wednesday Night Live program will meet on December 4 and December 11. We will resume in the new year on January 15, 2020.

session forms sustainability task force

For the past several years, FPCRO has operated with significant budgeted and actual deficits in the funding of our mission and ministry. Although many members and friends give sacrificially to the church and we utilize interest from various endowments given by saints in

the past, our expenses continue to exceed our income. For the past decade Session has approved a deficit budget in every year and in eight of those 10 years ended the year with an actual deficit. In the past three years, the deficit at year end has averaged \$80,000 per year. This situation is not sustainable. Unless changes are made, deficit spending at current levels will completely deplete the endowment fund in less than 20 years.

Leaders have explored ways of closing our deficit in past years. Although some recommendations were approved, the proposed changes to spending and/or revenues were not always carried out or were insufficient to meet the church's ongoing financial challenges. In order to continue our vibrant ministries and sustain our witness to Christ for the long term, we must take action to make the ministries of our church as sustainable as they are fruitful.

The Session is ultimately responsible both for the overall

budgeting process and for ensuring our congregation practices faithful stewardship of our financial resources. To that end, the Session created a **Sustainability Task Force** at its November meeting. The Task Force's members are Krispen Carroll (chairperson), Kevin Ball (secretary/reporter), the Rev. Emma Nickel, Adair Calder, Ron Coleman, Anne-Marie DeVantier, James Hanks, Scott Kortlandt, and Kevin Schnieders. Their mission is to identify and recommend to Session measures to align

the church's income and expenses in a sustainable manner both immediately and into the future, and to promote fiscal transparency within the church. They will work throughout the winter and spring and make their report to Session by its April 2020 meeting.


TASK FORCE



A Better Man


It's Gamache's first day back as head of the homicide department, a job he temporarily shares with his previous second-in-command, Jean-Guy Beauvoir. Floodwaters are rising across province. In the middle of the turmoil, a father approaches Gamache, pleading for help in finding his daughter.

As crisis piles upon crisis, Gamache tries to hold off the encroaching chaos, and realizes the search for Vivienne Godin should be abandoned. He has a daughter of his own and finds himself developing profound, and perhaps unwise, empathy for her distraught father.

Increasingly hounded by the question how would you feel...., he resumes the search.

As the rivers rise, and the social media onslaught against Gamaches becomes crueler, a body is discovered. And in the tumult, mistakes are made.

Gamache must face a horrific possibility, and a burning question: What would you do if your child's killer walked free?



Fly Girls: How Five Daring Women Defied All Odds and Made Aviation History


The untold story of five women who fought to compete against men in the high-stakes air races of the 1920s and 1930s—and won.

Between the world wars, no sport was more popular, or more dangerous, than airplane racing.

Thousands of fans flocked to multi-day events, and cities vied with one another to host them. The pilots themselves were hailed as dashing heroes who cheerfully stared death in the face. While, the men were hailed, female pilots were more often ridiculed for what the press portrayed as silly efforts to horn in. Fly Girls recounts how a cadre of women banded together to break the original glass ceiling: the entrenched prejudice that conspired to keep them out of the sky.

It is the story of five remarkable women: Florence Klingensmith, Ruth Elder, Amelia Earhart, Ruth Nichols and Louise Thaden. Together they fought for the chance to race against the men—and in 1936 one of them would triumph in the toughest race of all.

Fly Girls celebrates a forgotten moment when tenacious, trailblazing women braved all obstacles to achieve greatness.

Could Mrs. Graves's violent death have anything to do with her husband's profession? Someone in power may be framing the biographer to keep damaging secrets from coming to light. A theory leads Daniel's investigation to London's Special Branch and, disturbingly, to one of his father's closest colleagues.

Caught between duty to the law and a fierce desire to protect his family, Daniel must call on his keen intellect to find the truth, lest an innocent man hang for another's heinous crime.
