

From the Pastor's Desk...

Dear friends.

As we enter the season of Advent and prepare for Christ's birth, I am reflecting on the year we have just experienced. We are all aware of the challenges, hardships, and sorrows we have experienced. Those, and their enduring impact, we must not ignore. Yet I am also realizing how many amazing things have emerged in our church life from this year. Celebrate these positives with me, even as we yearn for God's coming at Christmas and the transition to a new kind of life that will bring us together in person once again.



- **1. Worship comes to you.** Though there are a few who sadly cannot connect with online worship, most of us now have access to worship each Sunday, no matter where we are! Whether at the cottage, in Florida, or right at home, we can still worship with our church family. Even if you're a little under the weather, you can still worship safely on your phone or computer. Folks who have moved away from the area have been able to reconnect with FPCRO. What a blessing!
- 2. Church technology has improved by leaps and bounds. We have improved our weekly email contact, which has also allowed Sunflowers Christian Preschool to connect with parents in this time. We have put our new sanctuary sound system to the test with livestreaming capability and are looking to increase our options even more. Zoom meetings have allowed more people to participate in committees and gatherings, even if they live a distance from the church.
- 3. Participation in worship leadership has changed and, in some ways, increased. We dearly miss the choir. Yet now that being a liturgist means doing a recording instead of public speaking, even more people are able to participate! We have been able to have college students who are far from home lead us. The wonders of technology have even allowed our musicians to join together for anthems without ever being in the same room, or even the same city.
- **4. Hospitality and intimacy look different.** Many of us have now been "in" each other's homes. You worshipped from my living room, as well as that of other staff members, for three months. When we log in to meetings we all get a little glimpse into each other's homes. We have learned the joy of dropping off or receiving a gift on our front porches, and the church has welcomed new neighbors in this way.
- 5. We are living our faith at home, not just at the church building. Since we can't come to church, all our mission, service, and worship takes place in our homes and with our families. This is always a goal of nurturing faith so that we don't see a disconnect between Sunday and Monday. Through HOME bags, at-home Vacation Bible School, Sunday school, and Advent wreaths, we have equipped one another to meet God where we are and to think about the meaning of our actions in relation to Bible stories and God's love.

My goal for the future is to build on the places we have grown over these past months. Also, to use these new skills to help us share with more people the message of God's love and the tools to make meaning of their faith lives.

Be blessed this season. Make your heart and your home ready to receive Christ one again. Give thanks for God's goodness, even as we grieve what cannot be this year.



As a Matthew 25 congregation, we have committed to being actively engaged in the world to eradicate systemic poverty, dismantle structural racism, and build congregational vitality. For the past two months, we've highlighted two of these focus areas to learn more about our commitment and how we can get involved. This month, we explore the final area, Congregational Vitality. What is congregational vitality?

You might think that the vitality of a congregation or worshiping community is based on the number of members, the scope of programs, the size of financial gifts or some other statistics. Not so — at least not entirely. Rather, a community's vitality is primarily its spiritual strength and its capacity for purposeful mission. We are vital when we are actively engaged in the mission of God in our local community and the world, and focused on growing as disciples in the way of Jesus Christ.



How do we work toward greater vitality in our own congregation?

To some extent, many local churches find themselves spiritually exhausted, financially fragile and discouraged. The Presbyterian Mission Agency of the PC(USA) proposes that there are seven marks of church vitality. Where do you think we fall on each? We can work to discern and renew our commitment to the habits that foster an energetic engagement with the Spirit's work in the world.

Here are the seven marks:

- 1.A commitment to forming disciples over every member's lifetime. This leads first to personal transformation, as people put on the heart of Christ, and then to social transformation, as people joyfully go forth into the community and tackle the issues facing today's culture.
- 2. Embracing the call to evangelism. We show forth the love of Christ by our actions and our lives. Our relationships are genuine and caring. People know we are Christians by our love.
- 3.An outward focus. Our church is not a place to escape from the world, but rather our gateway to our community where we may be the hands, feet, heart and mouth of Jesus Christ for people who are suffering or marginalized.
- 4.Empowering every member to discover their individual calling and the gifts God has given them so they can go forth and serve.
- 5. Spirit-inspired worship that challenges, teaches, transforms, convicts and energizes us, so we have experienced the wonder of God and are changed for the better from when we arrived.
- 6. Caring relationships modeled on God's love. We open our doors and hearts to all people, and we build relationships modeled on God's love, which leads to genuine reconciliation and peace.
- 7. Congregations with healthy systems. Our mission focuses are clear. There is fiscal responsibility and accountability. We have thoughtful decision-making structures. Our leaders and staff enjoy a sustainable balance of work/rest time.

What theological convictions inform congregational vitality?

God's gifts of Word and Sacrament establish and equip the church as the body of Christ in the world. The mission of the church flows from baptism, is nourished at the Lord's Supper, and serves to proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ to all. Worshiping communities experiencing congregational vitality will find themselves following Jesus into places of injustice and struggle bearing light and hope, demonstrating love and mercy, and working faithfully for justice and peace. Their efforts will be sustained by personal and congregational patterns and practices of prayer and worship, learning and reflection. They will be stewards of God's abundant gifts in service to God's children here and everywhere. They will demonstrate to the world God's promises and life-giving power in this age and the world to come.

SPECIAL WORSHIP DECEMBER 13

Traditionally, we celebrate the third Sunday of Advent with a musical presentation by our Chancel Choir. In this year, where everything is different, we will also mark this Sunday in a different way.

Our service that day will take the form of a Lessons and Carols service. Readings will be done by members of the congregation and responded to with a musical offering. Each of the Quartet will share a solo, the Jubilate bells will play, Jenn Muse will share her gifts on the flute, and we will once again hear the prophetic stories that tell of Jesus' coming, the visitation to Mary, Jesus' Birth, the adoration of the Shepherds and the Angels, and how the Word of God came to dwell among us.

There is probably no other season where we know so many of these stories "by heart." I always hope, as Advent approaches, to find a way to hear these stories with fresh ears, to welcome, once again, the Savior of Humankind into our world and my heart. To that end, this service will focus not so much on the familiar scriptures themselves, but on poetic reflections on them written by Susan Palo Cherwien. I discovered Cherwien's poetry over the summer and was drawn deeper into these stories through her words, and began to draft an idea for this service to be able to share them with you.

Susan Palo Cherwien is a poet and musician. She received her bachelor's degree in church music and voice from Wittenberg University, did further study in church music in Berlin Germany, and earned her master's degree from Mundelein College where she focused on spirituality, ritual, and the arts. Susan has composed numerous hymn texts which appear in denominational hymnals in the United States, Canada, and Europe and has written for the *Christian Century, Gather*, and *Word & World*. She is

the author of three hymn text collections and has three collections of reflections and poetry begun as meditations for hymn Festivals organized by Cherwien and her husband, David Cherwien, director of the National Lutheran Singers in Minneapolis.

Throughout all the readings, you will hear the theme of "Light," the light that shines in the darkness, the shimmering light of the angel Gabriel, the stars that burst forth into light, the light born out of the dark night in Bethlehem, the light which continues to illumine our way.

I hope that this service will help you to hear with new ears these familiar stories loved by us all and that you will join with us as we say Gloria in Excelsis Deo!

CHILDREN'S "WHILE YOU WAIT" ADVENT AT HOME



Meet Our New Singers

Ryan Hurley will temporarily fill the tenor soloist position while he takes a gap year before grad school, and FPCRO's own Audrey Frieberg will expand her role as preschool music director to assume the soprano soloist position. We are blessed by their participation in our program and include some biography information for you to get to know them better.



Audrey Frieberg grew up as an active member of the youth and choir programs in the church until going away to college. For the past 14 years, Audrey has been the hired soprano section leader and children's choir director at several churches in Michigan, New Jersey and Maryland. After moving out to Maryland for four years, she, her husband Brad and their two sons have returned back to Michigan

and are attending her home church, FPCRO, regularly. In addition to being the soprano section leader, she is also the preschool music director at FPCRO.

Audrey is also an active performer and classically trained opera singer. Most recently, Audrey returned to the Detroit Opera House last fall as a soloist and in the chorus with the Michigan Opera Theater in *Sweeney Todd* as well as the soprano soloist in Handel's *Messiah* with the Christ Church Chorale in Grosse Pointe. While living outside of Washington D.C., she sang onstage with the Washington National Opera Chorus in their productions of *Alcina* and *Don Carlo*. Further Washington D.C. operatic appearances include Betty June Binniker in the world premiere of Frances Pollock's opera *Stinney, The Barber of Seville* (Rosina) with Loudoun Lyric Opera, *Roméo et Juliette* (Maryland Lyric Opera), *Robin Hood* (Maid Marian) and *Haddon Hall* (Dorothy) with Victorian Lyric Opera, and *Cendrillon* (Fairy Spirit) with Bel Cantanti Opera.

While in Maryland, Audrey followed her passion of teaching children's music and became certified to teach early childhood music. Audrey also has a degree in music education from the University of Michigan and is an established voice teacher and has a large voice studio in the Berkley School District, where she is one of the in-house voice teachers.

Ryan Hurley is a tenor from Huntington Woods, Michigan and a recent graduate of the Juilliard School in New York City. At Juilliard, Ryan sang the title role in Offenbach's Orpheus in the Underworld and Chevalier de la Force in Poulanc's The Dialogues of the Carmelites. Ryan was a fellow with the Music Academy of the West in Santa Barbara, California where he performed as Reid in the West Coast



Premiere of Jennifer Higdon's *Cold Mountain* and as a soloist in Stravinsky's *Pulcinella* conducted by Thomas Adès with the Music Academy of the West Festival Orchestra. He was also an apprentice at the Internationale Meistersinger Akademie in Neumarkt, Germany. Ryan is a proud alumni of the Rackham Choir High School Internship Program (2013-2016) and the Michigan Opera Theatre Children's Choir (2009-2012) and is grateful to have been mentored by Joseph Jackson for over ten years!
