

From the Pastor's Desk...



Rock bands and musicians have long lamented the grind of work. Dolly Parton bemoaned, "Barely getting' by, What a way to make a livin" in "9 to 5." Bachman-Turner Overdrive told us how "You get up every morning, From your alarm clock's warning, Take the 8:15 into the city, There's a whistle up above, And people pushin,' people shovin'" in "Takin' Care of Business." Those who work a "regular" work week are always pushing toward Friday and the promise of the weekend. Soul-crushing bosses, difficult coworkers, a too-cold office, or a hectic commute can all make going to work feel like a drag.


Yet work is where we spend most of our time. And even though we all get bogged down at times, many of us find meaning in the work that we do each day, whether paid work or unpaid care giving labor. As Christians, we believe that God places a special call on each of our lives to serve in God's world. When we experience that call and seek to live it out, we are living into our vocation. For a lot of people, their vocation may align with the work they do each day.

Sometimes we think that only church workers, like pastors, or even monks and nuns, have a God-given vocation. But the Bible teaches us that all of us have a vocation: gifts and skills that are needed in the world. Even the most secular-seeming work can be done with intention that seeks to glorify God. We live out our vocation as we put our talents to use alongside other disciples.

In January and February, we will dive into a sermon series on work and vocation called Working for the Glory of God. In the gospel of Luke, we will explore the way Jesus lived into his vocation at the beginning of his ministry. In Paul's first letter to the Corinthians, we will ponder our spiritual gifts and the ways God needs each of us to put them to work as part of the body of Christ. In the prophets, we will be reminded of God's intimate claim on each of our lives and the ways God has called people into ministries in the past.

Each Sunday, a church member will share with us about their work and how they feel God has called them into it. We will hear how they understand the concept of vocation and how they are putting their gifts to work. I am personally excited to hear these stories. I think this kind of sharing opens all of us up to deeper relationships and new connections in the congregation. I hope, too, that hearing from fellow church members will invite us all to reflect on our vocations, whether that aligns with our paid work or some other aspect of our lives. How have we heard God's call in the past and how are we hearing it in new ways today?

We begin our series on January 13, with Baptism of the Lord Sunday. On that day, we remember Jesus' baptism, which signaled the official beginning of his ministry and God's call to him. It's a day for us to remember our baptisms, which call each of us into a life of ministry and discipleship. The series will conclude on February 10. After worship on that day, we will give thanks for the devoted staff of FPCRO at a Staff Appreciation reception. This is a fitting way to end our focus on vocation, as we give thanks for the people who commit their work-lives to this congregation and God's work through it. I hope you'll join us in worship as we explore these topics and then reflect on the themes as you go to your "9 to 5" work, consider the vocational opportunities of retirement, or explore the ways God is calling you as you pursue your education.

precedence over Sunday morning services. When I was no longer at home with my family to encourage me to go, it fell to the wayside.



WHAT IS A LITURGIST ANYWAY?

A Liturgist is a church member who participates in the worship service, typically reading scripture and leading other parts of the service. The word "liturgy," when applied to Christian worship, means "the work of the people." It's a place in the service where you can be a part of the worship. The liturgist speaks from the Lectern (right side facing the chancel). Typically, the liturgist may be asked to lead the Call to Worship, the Passing of Christ's Peace, the Prayer for Illumination, and the First Scripture Reading.

The Worship and Music committee would like to extend an invitation to any and all who are interested in being a liturgist. Our hope is to gather a list of people and set up a schedule three to four months in


