

From the Pastor's Desk...

Friends in Christ,

We try to let God guide us in all things. Yet it's often hard to know if we are really doing so. This fall, our church is implementing programs that feel like God really was the one who initiated them! During Vacation Bible School, the staff felt a strong sense of energy and excitement from the preschoolers participating in the program. The presence of the Spirit was strong through their singing, play, and ideas! As kids and adults of all ages interacted together, we experienced the Kingdom of God among us. We started to wonder if God might be speaking to us through the VBS week and inviting us into something new.

Through our goal-setting work last spring, program staff had already laid out a number of initiatives to invite our community into the church—particularly the families at Sunflowers Christian Preschool and families in the neighborhood. However, we realized that we currently have no on-going opportunities outside of the Sunday nursery for preschool aged children. Conversation with parents of some of our preschoolers indicated both an interest in and potential leadership for a new ministry. News of a possible bequest with funds designated for young children seemed to make clear that this was the Spirit at work, encouraging us to initiate something new.

Our efforts began with outreach to the Sunflowers Preschool families during the first days of school. In the lobby over coffee and bagels, connections among church, families, and preschool were made, relationships bloomed and just a few tears were shed by parents saying goodbye to little ones!

We were excited to share with them our new Making Music program at Wednesday Night Live, which offers play, music, and fun for preschoolers, and a more comprehensive approach to music education for elementary students. We hosted a demo of the preschool sessions at Sunflowers in September and heard interest from a number of families. There, we also shared about Kids in Christ (KiC) Club, WNL dinners, and our presentation of Michigan Opera Theater's *Jack & the Beanstalk* which took place at the end of September.

All of us felt so much excitement and joy watching the little ones! We felt blessed that we might have more opportunities to share God's love with them and their families. Please pray for everyone participating on Wednesday nights and that new folks would feel the Spirit surrounding them in love and grace as they participate with us.

In the midst of all this excitement, it was tough to receive the 2018-2019 end of year financial statements. We ended the year with a significant deficit of nearly \$100,000. We will have to take these funds from the principal of our endowment to cover the shortfall. That's hard to stomach when so many already give sacrificially to support God's work through this church and many more of us increased our pledges for the current year. It is clear that we need to begin a serious conversation about how to make our church's ministries sustainable. Because I know that God is good all the time, and all the time God is good, we will enter that process in a healthy way and do so with faith and trust. The energy of the preschoolers reminds me that God is always making things new. We will move through this new challenge with hope and expectation, seeking to become the church God is calling forth for the next 100 years.

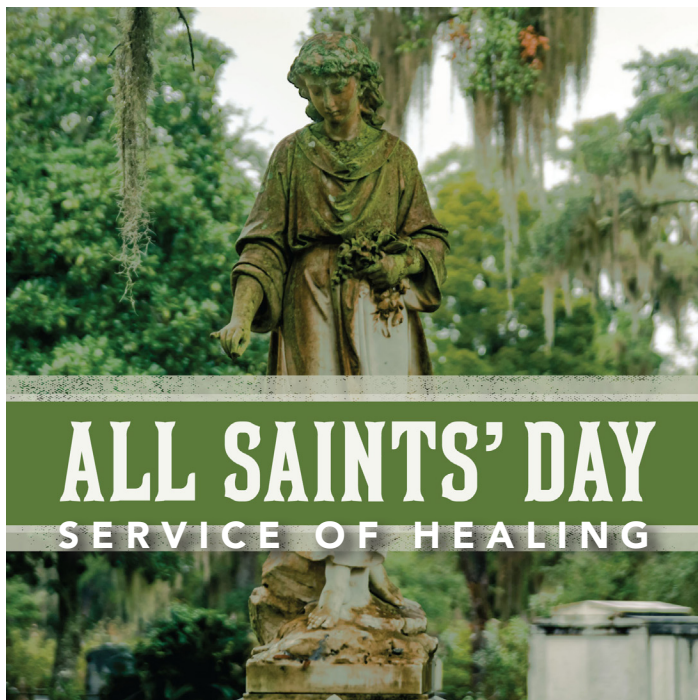

UNIFIED BOARD PROPOSAL

In August, both the Session and the Board of Trustees elected members to a Unicameral (Unified) Board Task Force. The Task Force is made of up Kevin Ball (Clerk of Session), Ginny O'Brien (Trustees chair), Derek Helenberger (Trustee), James Hanks (Elder), Kari Peruski (Church Administrator) and Rev. Emma Nickel (Pastor). The group has been meeting to explore the possibility of the Session assuming the obligations and responsibilities of the Trustees of the corporation of our church. This would result in the elimination of the separate Board of Trustees, which is provided for in the Presbyterian Church (USA) Book of Order G-4.0102.

If the congregation approved a change to the bylaws to move to the unified board, the arrangement would result in fewer congregation members required to sit on boards and a flatter, leaner structure for accomplishing church business. If implemented, our congregation would need to ensure that some committees were staffed with additional at-large members, and that the current duties of the Trustees (depositing the weekly offerings, counting, etc.) are maintained in other ways. The number of elders on the Session would remain the same, at 15 elders plus a youth elder. Currently, there

are two committees that report to Trustees—House and Grounds—and those would begin reporting to the Session directly. This change would go into effect in 2020 if approved by the congregation.

Conversations at Trustees and Session have been informative and healthy as we discuss this possible board structure for the future. Trustees are considering whether they might feel called to serve on the Session in the incoming class in order to carry over their wisdom and knowledge into the new structure.

Many churches throughout our denomination have made this move to a unified board over the years. The change would put us in line with similar congregations in the Presbytery and throughout the country.

Members of the task force will share a Minute for Mission about their work at both services on **Sunday, October 13**. They will host a **Q&A Session** following the 10:30 am service on **Sunday, October 27** in the Auxiliary Dining Room. If you have questions or want to know more, you're encouraged to attend the meeting, and/or to contact Pastor Emma or another member of the Task Force.

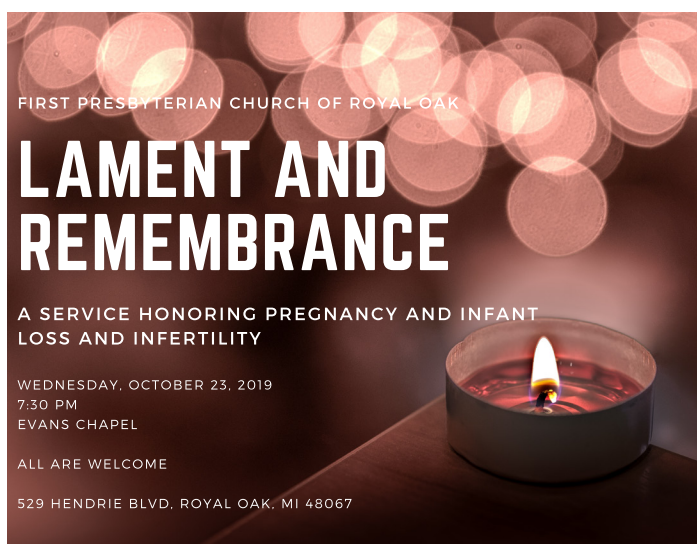

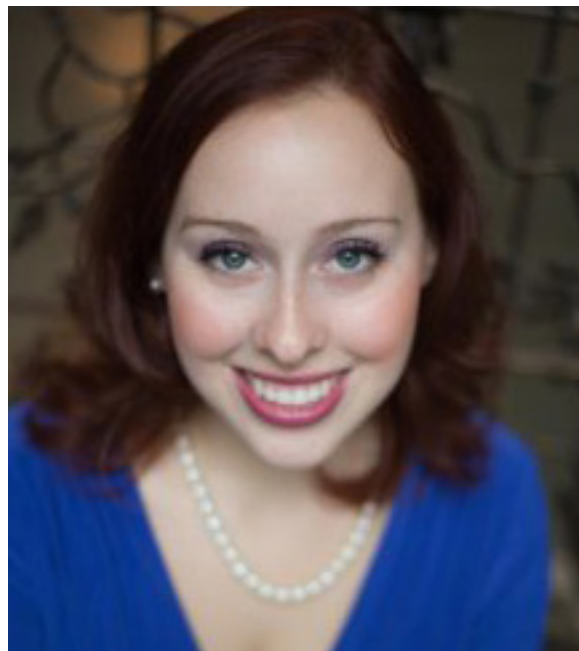

Calling First Presbyterian Church of Royal Oak her church home, Audrey grew up as an active member of the youth and choir programs in the church until going away to college. For the past 14 years, Audrey has been the hired soprano section leader and children's choir director at several churches in Michigan, New Jersey and Maryland. After moving out to Maryland for four years, she, her husband Brad and their two sons have returned to Michigan and are attending her home church, FPCRO, regularly.

While in Maryland, Audrey followed her passion of teaching children's music and became certified to teach early childhood music. Through a combination of activity, games and basic music principles, she is able to encourage young children to find their voices and grow their love of music in an immersive atmosphere. Audrey also has a degree in music education from the University of Michigan. She was an often requested substitute teacher in Michigan and Maryland school districts, specifically for elementary music classes. Audrey is an established voice teacher and has a large voice studio in the Berkley School District, where she is one of the in house voice teachers.



Audrey, an active performer and classically trained opera singer, appeared, while living in the D.C. area, with The Washington National Opera, Loudon Lyric Opera, Maryland Lyric Opera, Victorian Lyric Opera and the Bel Cantati Opera. She will be returning to the Detroit Opera House as a soloist and in the chorus of Michigan Opera Theater's production of Sweeney Todd. We are so pleased to offer this new class which we hope will not only reach our current children, but connect us more with Sunflowers Pre-School and families in our neighborhood.

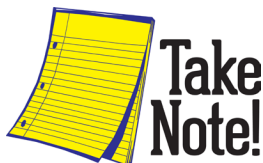
WEDNESDAY NIGHT LIVE

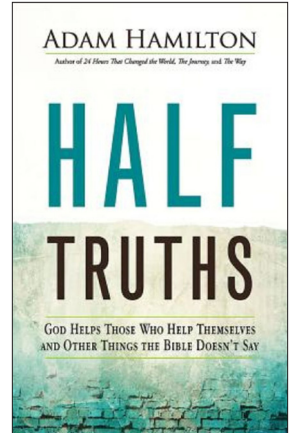

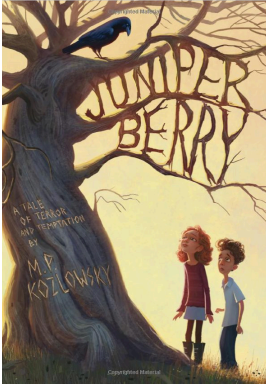

Juniper Berry

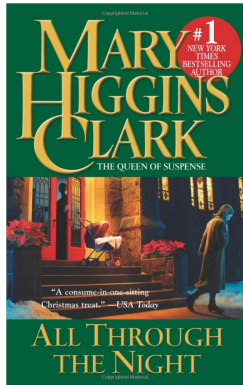
