From the Pastor's Desk...

My friends,

I think it's time to dig deep. I think in these next few months we need to press into our prayer life, our seeking out of God's presence, and our calling on the Spirit for sustenance. I don't know about you, but my tolerance is wearing thin for all the precautions needed in our pandemic way of life, and the news events in the world aren't helping me any. Don't hear me wrong, I remain committed to all of it: masks, social distancing, and continuing to create ministry and worship opportunities that we can all engage in safely.



But still...it's hard. I said this fall I thought we would hit the year mark of worshipping online, and next month, unfortunately, we will get there.

Some of you have been able to get vaccinated and for that I give deep thanks to God. Many of us are still waiting and may have to continue waiting for many months ahead. The new variants of this virus are leading case counts higher by the day, as I write this, and the experts say we have a long way to go before things get more under control. The Pandemic Response Team meets monthly to review the situation and to determine how our church can respond. We continue to adjust our restrictions on being in the building based on the severity of things. And though we have had things in the building ready for a return since the summer, we continue to believe that worship at home and online is the safest choice for our congregation. You can read more in this newsletter about how you can contribute to our plans to upgrade technology to ensure we can livestream worship services into the future, even after we are back in-person.

This month, Lent begins. Lent is a season that asks us to turn away from things that call us away from God and instead, to return to God with renewed intention. In the midst of feeling tired of and grieved by the world as it is, Lent offers a path to turn our emotions into seeds that can sprout and blossom into growth. This season, I hope you'll consider these ways to dig deep and allow our faith to sustain you.

- Make plans to mark the start of Lent—put a note in your calendar to pick up a *Way of Love Lenten Kit*, or to come for drive-up ashes on Ash Wednesday, February 17 (12-1 pm & 4-6 pm).
- Choose a Lenten practice or discipline. This doesn't have to be something you give up, though it could be. Choose to pray or meditate, or just have quiet while you drink one cup of tea each evening (no phones or TV to distract you). Choose to call one fellow church member each week of Lent on the phone. Choose to read your kids a Bible story every Sunday or every day during Lent. Whatever you choose, be intentional and look for God's presence as you do it.
- Connect your financial giving with your commitment to God this season. We will **dedicate our pledges for 2021-2022 on Sunday, February 21 in worship**. Traditionally, giving alms was an important Lenten practice, and this coming year we are all invited to dedicate an additional \$5 per week to God's work. When we do that together, we will add \$55,000 to our church's funding for ministries. Look for your stewardship packet in the mail, and mail your pledge card back to us soon, before you forget. Or, submit it online this year!
- Attend the online **Lenten Reflection services** which invite us into stillness as we contemplate scripture.
- Sign-up and commit to attend the **Lenten retreat** on March 5-6. While staying at home, we will enjoy dedicated times to worship together on Zoom, reflect on our lives, and find ways to strengthen our devotion to God.

May God bless your intentions and sustain you in all that you are doing,




WORSHIP ONLINE WITH FPCRO



ASH WEDNESDAY IS FEBRUARY 17

You're invited to receive the imposition of ashes in a **Drive-Up format** this year. We'll offer ashes from 12-1 pm and 4-6 pm on Wednesday, February 17. Drive your car up to the sidewalk in front of the Christian Education lobby entrance, roll down your window, keep your face mask on, and remain in your vehicle. Pastor Emma or Joelle Jarrait will greet you wearing full personal protective gear to keep everyone safe. They'll impose ashes with a clean, disposable cotton swab to anyone in the car who would like to receive them, whether on the forehead or the hand. You can also receive a small temporary tattoo with the sign of the ashes to apply to a hand or just to keep with you as a reminder of this meaningful symbol. The Way of Love Lenten Kits will also be available for pick-up at this time.



A short, online Ash Wednesday worship service will be available on our website and Facebook page for you to watch anytime that day.

TRAVEL THE WAY OF LOVE THIS LENT


From Ash Wednesday on February 17, until Easter on April 4, we are invited to focus on traveling the Way of Love. This is a set of practices that embody what it means to follow Jesus Christ. Conceived by Bishop Michael Curry in the Episcopal Church, this notion reminds us that disciples are people who live their lives in a certain way, patterned after Jesus. These seven practices are simple, yet deep. We will Turn, Learn, Worship, Pray, Bless, Rest, and Go. We will focus on

> one practice each Sunday in Lent, ending with Pray on Good Friday.



Lenten Evening Reflection Services



Fourteen years ago, I had the idea to provide a brief service during Lent where people could reflect in silence as a response to scripture and poetry; a service of prayer where we might listen for what God is saying to us, a respite from the clamor of our everyday lives. And so, the Lenten Evening Reflection service was born and has continued for these many years. It had always been at 6:00 pm on Thursday evenings, which kept many from being able to attend. This year, the weekly service will be available online each week beginning with the week of February 21, and run for five weeks. I hope you will consider joining me for one at your convenience.

I am sure you ask "a musician promoting a service with silence in it?" Silence is of utmost importance in this service. Silence helps us be more deliberate than rushed in our worship and encourages a contemplative attitude. Silence follows the readings, allowing not only time to reflect on the meaning of the word, but time to absorb it as a personal prayer. In this way the words of scripture give guidance to the words of our own prayers, and we learn to listen to the prompting of the Spirit within us.

The services follow the order of Evening Prayer, which comes at the end of the workday. It is the offering of the past day to God, reflecting on what has happened, offering to God our praise for the gifts we have received, and confessing our failures as well. We commit it all to God, recommitting ourselves at the same time.

Join me for these brief twenty to thirty minute services which I hope will enhance your Lenten journey.

LIVESTREAM UPGRADES AND WAYS TO CONTRIBUTE

In January, the Session approved the purchase of new equipment

and technology for livestreaming worship. Church leaders believe we are called to continue offering worship in an online format, even after we return to the sanctuary for inperson services because we will then no longer pre-record worship. We plan to livestream the 10:30 am service each week. There is value in continuing to make online services easily available to those searching for a church community and also to current members who may be away, sick at home, or unable to attend church for other reasons. This is a way to do evangelism in our local community, as well as to minister to those we may never meet. Just as we seek to offer our best to God in the sanctuary service, we believe it is important to provide a high-quality worship experience for those at home and we will be able to do that with this equipment.

The cost of these upgrades is \$6,000. The Session is inviting members and friends to make a gift toward this cost and to future technology enhancements, which were not anticipated during the budgeting process for this year. Your gifts will allow us to move forward with the installation, and be prepared to use this technology sooner. If you would like to donate, you can mail a check to the church marked "livestream" or donate through our GIVE button online, being sure to type 'livestream' as your gift designation. We are grateful for your contributions to this ministry!

JANUARY SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

The meeting opened with an exploration of a TED Talk by Priya Parker who invites us to make gatherings meaningful and transformative. We brainstormed ways to incorporate her ideas in church gatherings from meetings to potlucks.

HIGHLIG

- Approved a minor change to our current COVID-19
 restrictions recommended by the Pandemic Response
 Team. For purposes of worship or mission, two to
 three church members will be allowed to gather in the
 building to complete their ministry through February
 16. Other precautions remain the same.
- Noting the continued challenges surrounding hunger and food insecurity in these times, Session agreed to send donations of \$1,000 each to Lighthouse, Blessings in a Backpack of Royal Oak, and the Presbytery of Detroit for Shared Mission.
- Approved the purchase up to \$6,000 of upgraded technology and equipment to enhance our livestreaming capability into the future. And agreed to invite the congregation to make direct gifts toward this effort, which will allow us to reach members and potential members at home, even after a return to inperson services.
- Discerned that God is calling us into a mutual partnership with Hope Presbyterian Church in Detroit, a predominantly black congregation. We plan to explore an initial shared event, such as an online concert and fundraiser for local mission.

MISSION AND BENEVOLENCE UPDATE

On behalf of FPCRO, the Mission and Benevolence Committee continues to support neighbors in need. Since November 2020, Session has approved gifts totaling \$2,000 to Lighthouse of Oakland County and gifts in the amount of \$1,000 to each of the following organizations: Blessings in a Backpack (Royal Oak), Cass Community Social Services, Gleaners, Open Hands Food Pantry (St. John's Episcopal Church), Royal Oak Youth Assistance, and The Presbytery of Detroit for their Shared Mission ministry. All funds were from the Mission and Benevolence budget.

FEBRUARY H.O.M.E. PROJECT

We will be celebrating the dedication of front line workers in the Cardiac Care Unit at the DMC during February. The 70 person unit will be the recipients of the H.O.M.E. mission project for February.



Each H.O.M.E. bag will contain two cards and two goodie bags that you can fill and return. Since wintry February is when Valentine's Day is celebrated, hearts and snowmen would be great inspiration for your artwork. Inside the card has room for a positive message and/or a favorite Bible verse. If you sign the card please use only a first name. We aim for 70 cards, one for each person in the Cardiac Care Unit. In adddtion to pre-packed snacks and treats as goodies, a nurse from the hospital has said that small hand sanitizer, lip balm, and unscented hand lotion to carry with them are greatly appreciated. The constant wearing of projective gear and hand washing are taking a toll on the staff's hands.

Our three-year-olds will be practicing more with scissors this month, and working on printing our names independently. It's not easy!










2021 Book of the Month Challenge






